<u>Pamela M Cole, '72</u>, a professor at Penn State University and former Fulbright Scholar, who has dedicated her more than 45-year career to child clinical and developmental psychology. She is currently leading five research projects and has authored or coauthored more than 90 publications.



<u>Phillip Grant, MBA, '08</u>, Chief Executive Officer of the Hunts Point Produce Market, the largest wholesale produce market in the nation. Under his leadership, the Market partners with local food rescue and food-service organizations to donate surplus produce. It has provided fresh produce to Mercy's May Market Food and Resource Pantry for the last two years.



<u>Liz Longmore, '09 M.S. '11</u>, Senior Vice President and Chief Operating Officer for Stamford Health, who began her career in nursing, first in women's health care and then expanding to emergency services and critical care. Before her current position, she spearheaded the design, construction and operationalization of the new Stamford Hospital.



Shannon Freeman, '14, an intern for News 12 Westchester while earning her bachelor's degree, she has worked as a Television Director for CBS News streaming channel for the last eight years. She also mentors students of the Reels Works program, assisting them with short documentaries to be shown at film festivals around the New York City area.

She later served as a social worker for the Mount Vernon City School District for 18 years.
